Its altitude ranges from approximately 350 meters to over 6,000 meters above sea level, creating diverse climatic zones from sub-tropical in the lower areas to alpine in the higher altitudes.

The region can be divided into three major geographic zones:

Shivalik Hills: The outermost range with gentle slopes and dense forests, known for pine and deodar trees, fertile valleys, and agricultural lands.

Middle Himalayas: This region includes popular hill stations like Shimla, Kullu, and Manali, characterized by moderate elevation, river valleys, apple orchards, and terraced fields.

Greater Himalayas (Trans-Himalayas): Home to high-altitude deserts, such as the Spiti Valley, this zone has harsh conditions and sparse vegetation. The peaks in this region, like Reo Purguil, reach over 6,000 meters.

Flora and Fauna: Himachal's forests are home to deodar, oak, rhododendron, and pine, and its wildlife includes the snow leopard, Himalayan brown bear, ibex, and a rich diversity of birds.
